Update Procedure

The update instructions given in section 1 of this release note are up to date; any deviating instructions in the operating manual are to be ignored.

If you have received this document together with a new analyzer, you can skip section 1.

If you have received the document together with a firmware update kit or as a download together with a self-extracting archive file, you should read section 1.

Documentation of Firmware Modifications

1 Firmware Update

No preparations are required.

Contents of Firmware Update Kit

The update kit comprises the following:

Update Procedure

1. If you have received a self-extracting archive file per e-mail or as a download

a set of disks must first be created from the archive file.

Proceed as follows:

Ø Check if you have received all files

disk1.bin	self extracting ZIP file, used to generate update disk 1
data2.cab	packed contents of disk 2, automatically unpacked during FW update
data3.cab	packed contents of disk 3, automatically unpacked during FW update
data4.cab	packed contents of disk 4, automatically unpacked during FW update
data5.cab	packed contents of disk 5, automatically unpacked during FW update
data6.cab	packed contents of disk 6, automatically unpacked during FW update
data7.cab	packed contents of disk 7, automatically unpacked during FW update
data8.cab	packed contents of disk 8, automatically unpacked during FW update
data9.cab	packed contents of disk 9, automatically unpacked during FW update

Keep nine DOS-formatted 3.5" / 1.44 Mbyte disks ready.

- Ø Create a temporary directory on your PC (e.g. FSIQTEMP on C:\). For this you require about 14 Mbyte free memory capacity on your hard disk..
- Ø Copy file disk1.bin to this temporary directory
- Ø Rename file disk1.bin to disk1.exe
- Ø Execute disk1.exe, e.g. by using the following command sequence for Windows95/NT:

```
<CTRL><ESC> - RUN - C:\FSIQTEMP\DISK1 - <ENTER> (English version) or
<CTRL><ESC> - AUSFÜHREN - C:\FSIQTEMP\DISK1 - <ENTER> (German version)
```

The files are extracted.

Ø Delete file disk1.exe in the temporary directory.
The temporary directory should contain the following files:

isdel.exe setup.dll inst32i.ex sys1.cab user1.cab layout.bin data.taq data1.cab dskcount.txt lang.dat os.dat readme.txt setup.exe setup.ini setup.ins setup.iss setup.lid

- Ø Copy all files to update disk 1 (FSIQ V4.40.2 DISK1).
 Check if all files are on the disk with their correct names. In particular, the underscores ("_" as in " inst32iex ") are essential for a successful update.
- Ø The contents of the other 8 disks are already in the format needed for the update. Files data2.cab, data3.cab, ..., data8.cab must be copied to the corresponding disks DISK2, DISK3, ..., DISK9.

The disks are now ready, and you can continue with section 2 "If you have received a firmware update kit on a disk ...".

Notes: If any error messages are output during creation of a disk, the installation process for the disk in question must be repeated. Before re-creating the disk, check if the write protection has been removed.

2. If you have received a firmware update kit on a disk ...

You can load the firmware directly from the disk to your signal analyzer.

- Ø Insert the disk DISK 1 into the drive.
- \emptyset Press the SETUP key and change to the side menu by pressing \rightarrow key.
- Ø Press the FIRMWARE UPDATE softkey.
- Ø Start the update by pressing the UPDATE softkey and follow the instructions on the analyzer display.

First, the contents of the update disks are copied to the hard disk of the instrument. Then the files are extracted and copied in the directories accordingly. After the extraction, the instrument is rebooted.

The firmware update is complete.

The previous firmware version may be restored using softkey *RESTORE*. Perform a total calibration (CAL - CAL TOTAL menu) after the firmware update.

3. If problems occur during the firmware update ...

The new firmware can if necessary also be loaded under NT. This should be done only with an external keyboard and a mouse. Log-in has to be made using the ADMINISTRATOR function, and the device firmware has to be terminated.

Log in as administrator. This procedure is described in the operating manual (PC function), too.

- Ø Press key combination ALT SYSREQ to switch to NT screen if not yet displayed.
- Ø Call up the NT task bar START SHUT DOWN.
- Ø Select 'Close all programs and logon as different user'.
- Ø Hold the SHIFT key down and press the YES key to leave the input window until the login window appears.
- Ø Release the SHIFT key as soon as the login window appears.
- Ø Now enter administrator as user name and 894129 as password.

Terminate the device firmware:

- Ø Press the keys CTRL ALT DEL on the external keyboard simultaneously.
- Ø Select the Task Manager.
- Ø Select the Application R&S Analyzer Instrument and terminate it with End Task.

Now the new firmware can be loaded:

- Ø Insert DISK 1 into drive A:
- Ø Start the installation with START RUN A:SETUP. You will be prompted to insert the remaining disks one after the other.

After loading the software, the operating system is rebooted. Then change back from administrator to instrument (password instrument) for the login (see operating manual) This is done in the same way as changing of login to administrator.

Note: If the firmware is installed in this way, the previous version cannot be restored.

Correction of Operating Manual, Section "Windows-NT Software Installation"

The stated path for starting the reinstallation is only valid for software pack 3 ("C:\SP3\l386\update"). To start the reinstallation of software pack 5 path "C:\SP5\l386\update\update" has to be entered into the command line.

Additional adjacent channel power standards



Input Attenuation 0 dB can no longer be set via Roll-key

In order to prevent the input attenuation from being inadvertently switched off, value 0 dB can only be set via manual input. The input attenuation can only be reduced up to 10 dB via roll-key or UP/DOWN keys.

ASCII Trace Export

The ASCII CONFIG menu was extended by softkey COMMENT:



The ASCII COMMENT softkey activates the entry of comment concerning the current ASCII data set. A total of 60 characters are available for this purpose.

ASCII trace export is available now in VECTOR ANALYZER mode



In vector analyzer mode, the *ASCII EXPORT* softkey stores the corresponding trace in a file with ASCII format. For measurement results that are output in tables (Symbol Table, Error Summary, Modulation Summary), this function is not available.

Upon pressing the ASCII EXPORT softkey, a file name can be entered. The default name is TRACE.DAT. Then the measured data of the trace are stored. The function can be configured in the *ASCII CONFIG* submenu (see trace export for analyzer mode).

Structure of the ASCII file:

The file consists of the header containing important measurement and scaling parameters and a data section containing the trace data.

The data of the file header consist of three columns, each separated by a semicolon: parameter name; numeric value; basic unit

The data section starts with the keyword "Trace <n> " (<n> = number of stored trace), followed by the measured data in one or several columns (depending on measurement) which are also separated by a semicolon.

This format can be read in from spreadsheet calculation programs, e.g. MS-Excel. It is necessary to define ';' as a separator.

Selection of Trace Averaging Method

Section "Trace Selection and Setup" of the operating manual was extended to include the selection of the trace averaging mode.

TRACE 1 right side menu:



The AVERAGE LIN/LOG softkey switches between linear and logarithmic averaging in case of logarithmic level display.

In case of logarithmic averaging, the dB values of the display voltage are averaged, in case of linear averaging the level values in dB are converted into linear voltages or powers prior to averaging. These voltages or powers are averaged and then again converted into level values.

For stationary sinewave signals the two averaging methods yield the same result

Logarithmic averaging is recommended if sinewave signals are to clearly stand out against the noise since, with this averaging, noise suppression is greater while the sinewave signals remain unchanged.



New Digital cdma2000 Standards

The two new digital standards cdma2000 SR1/DS FWD and cdma2000 SR1/DS REV were implemented in addition to existing standard cdma2000 SR3/DS FWD.



THD Measurement (VECTOR ANALYZER Mode, Analog Demodulation)



REAL TIME ON only.



The %THD ON/OFF softkey activates the %THD measurement (= similar to SINAD measurement, but result displayed in %) for the main modulation signal.

Irrespective of the signal applied, the main modulation signal is compared with the main modulation signal which is filtered by a 1-kHz notch filter. The display unit is %.

When a signal modulated with 1 kHz is applied, the %THD value is thus displayed correctly.

Default setting is %THD OFF.

With **REAL TIME OFF** (no real-time demodulation) no %THD measurement is possible, the softkey cannot be operated.

FSIQK73: Modified sweeptime for higher measurement accuracy

Within the SPECTRUM EMISSION measurement the default sweeptime has been changed to two seconds in order to reach a higher measurement accuracy. The sweeptime can be manually changed by the user.

FSIQK73: Extended range for scrambling code

The range for the scrambling code now reaches from 0 to 0xFFFFFF $(0...2^{24}-1)$. In FW release 4.20 the range was 0 to 0xFFFFF $(0...2^{20}-1)$, in earlier versions it was 0...0xFFFF $(0...2^{16}-1)$.

RSIB Interface - Unix Environment

An Unix operating system can be installed on an external computer in addition to a Windows operating system. In this case, the control applications are created either in C or C++. The supported Unix operating systems include:

- Sun Solaris 2.6 Sparc Station
- · Sun Solaris 2.6 Intel Platform
- Red Hat Linux 6.2 x86 Processors

In order to access the measuring equipment via the RSIB interface, copy the librsib.so.X.Y file to a directory for which the control application has read rights.X.Y in the file name indicates the version number of the library, for example 1.0.

The librsib.so.X.Y library is created as a *shared library*. The applications using the library have nothing to do with versions. They simply link the library with the lrsib option. The following instructions have to be observed so that linking can be successfully performed and the library can be found during the program run:

File link:

• Use the operating system command *In* to create a file with the link name librsib.so and pointing to librsib.so.X.Y in a directory for which the control application has read rights. Example:

```
$ ln -s /usr/lib/librsib.so.1.0 /usr/lib/librsib.so
```

Linker options for creating applications:

- -lrsib:import library
- -Lxxx: path information where the import library can be found. This is where the above file link has been created. Example: -L/usr/lib.

Additional linker options for creating applications (only under Solaris):

-Rxxx: path information where the library is searched for during the program run:
 -R/usr/lib.

Run-time environment:

• Set environment variable LD_RUN_PATH to the directory in which the file link has been created. This is necessary only if librsib.so cannot be found in the standard search path of the operating system and the -R linker option (only Solaris) was not specified.

For C/C++ programming, the declarations of the library functions and the definition of error codes are contained in:

C/C++: 'RSIB.H' (D:\R_S\Instr\RSIB)

RSIB Interface Functions

Option FSIQB70 has a storage capacity of 512 K for the real and imaginary part. The data is stored to the memory with a sampling rate of 25.6 MHz which results in a maximum record length of approx. 20 ms. The 10 MHz IF filter is always active during recording. This filter is equalized with respect to magnitude and phase at a bandwidth of 8 MHz prior to data output.

A resampling of data at the user-defined sampling rate follows. No further band limiting is performed prior to resampling. The user has to take care that the sampling rate is high enough to satisfy the Nyquist criterion.

FREE RUN, EXTERN and VIDEO are available as the trigger sources. Like in vector analysis, the slope can also be determined for external trigger and video trigger and a time offset of the trigger time with respect to the output signal can be defined.

The output signal consists of a list of sampling values which are transmitted via the IEC/IEEE bus. The real parts are read first followed by the complete list of imaginary parts. The FORMAT command allows to select either binary output (32 bit IEEE 754 floating point) or ASCII output. The binary format is recommended for long data records because of the shorter transmission times.

It can be queried with commands ":STATus:QUEStionable:SYNC:CONDition?" and ":STATus:QUEStionable:SYNC[:EVENt]?".

Using user-defined limit lines via the remote-control interface with GSM BTS ANALYZER and GSM MS ANALYZER, Options FSE-K10 and FSE-K11

If user-defined limit lines are to be remote-controlled in applications K10/K11, the following should be observed:

- Limit lines can be created with the commands of the basic unit (CALC:LIM subsystem). Lines created in such a way are available as limit line files in the unit and cannot be distinguished from the "normal" limit lines.
- A user-defined limit line should meet certain criteria (example: Frequency Domain should be selected for the transient spectrum measurement of K11) so that it can be used for a specific K10/K11 measurement. If an attempt is made to activate a non-compatible line, the unit returns the error message "-221, settings conflict".
- K10/K11 measurements require either no limit line or one (spurious, transient spectrum, modulation spectrum) or two limit lines (power vs time measurement). To ensure that measurements are performed as expected, select and activate at least the required number of limit lines (commands CALC1:LIM1:NAM and CALC1:LIM1:STATE) when using user-defined limit lines. It is not possible to activate a user-defined limit line, e.g. in the power vs time measurement, and then assume that the application will automatically select the second line to standard.
- Suffix 1 is always to be used for measurements with one line: CALC1:LIM1!
- For measurements with two lines, suffix 1 is to be used for lower limits and suffix 2 for upper limits.
- After selection and activation of the required number of limit lines, it is possible to activate the use of user-defined lines with command CONF:BTS:LIM:STAN OFF (K11) or CONF:MS:LIM:STAN OFF (K10).
- It is recommended not to use the names of lines for the limit line standard (e.g. DC_BNL and DC_BNU) as names of user-defined limit lines in order to make the query of limit line characteristics unambiguous.

3 New Features, Improvements and Modifications

This section describes the new features and modifications of firmware version 4.40.

- Probe ON/OFF softkey in transducer menu
- Modified Channel Power measurement for standards W-CDMA 3GPP (FWD and REV) due to a new release of the standard (analyzer mode)
- Modified Channel Power measurement due to a new release of the standard (options FSIQK72 and FSIQK73)
- Modified Video Bandwidth for CCDF and Time Domain (options FSIQK72 and FSIQK73)
- Channels without Pilot Bits can be detected (option FSIQK72)
- Limit Lines for Power vs Time measurement in 1900 MHz band (PCS) changed

Probe ON/OFF softkey in transducer menu

The probe ON/OFF softkey from the UNIT menu has been copied to the transducer menu.

Modified Channel Power measurement for standards W-CDMA 3GPP

The 3gPP documents 25.141 and 34.121 have changed from 3V8 (200112) to 3V9 (2002-03) concerning the measurement of power ("mean power", see sections 3.1, 6.2 and 6.5). These changes have been introduced into the firmware for standards W-CDMA 3GPP FWD and. W-CDMA 3GPP REV. Other standards are unchanged.

Please note, that the Adjacent Channel Leakage Power Ratio (ACLR) now uses a different definition of power ("RRC filtered mean power") than the Power measurement itself ("mean power"). For users who want to measure the channel power "the old way", it is possible to switch the RRC filter ON.

FSIQ-K72, FSIQ-K73: Modified Channel Power and SEM measurements

The 3gPP documents 25.141 and 34.121 have changed from 3V8 (2001-12) to 3V9 (2002-03) concerning the measurement of power ("mean power", see sections 3.1, 6.2 and 6.5). These changes have been introduced into the application firmware FSIQ-K72 and FSIQ-K73.

Please note, that the Adjacent Channel Leakage Power Ratio (ACLR) now uses a different definition of power ("RRC filtered mean power") than the Power measurement itself ("mean power"). For users who want to measure the channel power "the old way", it is possible to use the channel powerfunction of the spectrum analyzer (see not above). For the SEM measurement the channel power measurement works like for the channel power.

FSIQ-K72, FSIQ-K73: Modified Video Bandwidth for CCDF and Time Domain

The video bandwidth has been changed from 5 MHz to 3 MHz. The new bandwidth leads to more accurate results for clipped signals.

FSIQ-K72: Channels without Pilot Bits can be detected

Up to firmware 4.30 channels without pilot bits (e.g. the PICH channel) could only be detected using mode "code channel predefined". Now they are detected also with mode "code channel autosearch".

FSE-K10: New Limit Lines for PvT Measurement

Only for GSM 1900 (PCS): The limit lines for GSM 1900 are different in the documents 45.005 and 51010. From FW 4.40 on, the FSE/FSIQ uses the slightly weaker lines from norm 51010.

4 Faults Remedied in Version V4.40

Note: Several of the listed faults were already fixed in service packs 4.30.x.

General errors

Selftest Failed, but Instrument Okay

Sometimes it could happen, that the selftest reportet "FAILED", but the instrument was OK.

Recall Data Set Lists on Floppy Disks

When looking which save sets are stored on a floppy disk, the firmware did not recognize if a new disk was inserted.

GSM/EDGE MS/BTS ANALYZER, FSE-K10/11/20/21/30/31

Selected Spurious Steps not in Save Sets

Within the spurious measurement it is possible to select/deselect some steps. This information was not stored in save sets, and so could not be restored after a recall.

Modulation Accuracy Status did not take into account all items (EDGE only)

The modulation accuracy status was PASSED even if the origin offset or 95% percentile was FAILED.

New method for power measurement of EDGE signals

The measurement of the signal power for EDGE signals is improved in 4.40. The new method leads to up to 0.5 dB higher values. This especially means, that the upper limit line within the Power Vs Time measurement now is about 0.5 dB higher. The measurement of GSM signals shows no difference.

Operating Mode 3GPP BTS ANALYZER (Option FSIQK72)

Marker To Peak in Peak Code Domain Error (CDP)

The marker was placed on the first instead of the last slot.

SYNC TYPE SCH

Synchronisation with "SYNC TYPE SCH" did not work.

SCPI: S-CCPCH Channel with out Pilot Bits (CDP, Code Channel Predefined)

With the command CONF: WCDP: BTS: CTAB: DATA it was not possible to define a S-CCPCH channel without pilot bits.

Operating Mode 3GPP MS ANALYZER (Option FSIQK73)

No Negative Frequency Error (CDP)

A frequency error less than zero was shown as "0.0".

Tracking Generator

Wrong Level for Small Frequencies in Zero Span

For a zero span measurement at a frequency less than about 1 MHz and a resolution bandwidth of 30 kHz the measured level could be to high (only if the frequency was the last changed instrument setting).

5 Faults Remedied in Service Pack 2

Note: Service Pack 1 does not exist. This number is skipped due to internal reasons.

General

Hardcopy on Floppy Disk

In rare cases a hardcopy to the floppy disk produced a corrupted file.

Mode Analyzer

Spurious at 3.809 and 3.914GHz

The specification for inherent spurious response is now also valid at 3.809 and 3.914 GHz receiving frequency.

FSE 26, FSE 40: Drop in Level with Spans > 16 GHz and RBW 50 kHz or smaller

Drops in level could occur with spans >16 GHz and small resolution bandwidth (<= 50 kHz).

Sweep pausing several seconds

When switching the RF Attenuation while using a FFT filter the sweep could stop for several seconds.

Mode Vector Analyzer

Trigger to Sync result dependents on points per symbol setting

Measuring the "Trigger to Sync Start Time" (Error Summary, external trigger, find sync on) is erroneously influenced by changing points per symbol from 4 to 16, when symbol rates below 64kHz are used.

Mode WCDMA BS Analyzer (FSIQ-K72 and FSIQ-K74)

SEM Limit Lines x-axis point 7.5 MHz corrected to 8.0 MHz

Three predefined limit lines were corrected.

Channel Table TM5_8 with wrong timing offset

Channel table TM5_8 showed a wrong timing offset for the DPCH channel with code 3 (4608 instead of 32768 chips).

6 Faults Remedied in Service Pack 3

Mode WCDMA BS Analyzer (FSIQ-K72/73/74)

CCDF Measurement

The % marker did not stop at the point of the sample with the highest level. Instead for small percentage values it was placed in the middle between this point and the right hand end of the x-axis.

7 Known Problems

Error with IEEE-Bus file transfer using repeat addressing

If "repeat addressing" is selected for the controller of the IEEE Bus, some bytes may be corrupted when transfering files by low level commands via the IEEE bus from the FSIQ to the controller computer. This error happens only if the following conditions hold:

- repeat addressing
- block size less than 4096 bytes
- large files (approximately more than 400 kB)

Workaround: The problem can be avoided by either disable repeat addressing or by setting the block size to at least 4096 bytes

Operating Mode 3GPP BTS ANALYZER (Option FSIQK72, FSIQK74)

TRACE: DATA? ABIT

When querying the bitstream values of all slots ("TRACE: DATA? ABIT") in the case of free running trigger, the bits of slot 0 and 1 may belong to the frame following the frame to which all other bits belong.

Workaround: Perform measurement with external trigger (TRIGGER EXTERN).

Operating Modes FSE-K10 and FSE-K11 (GSM measurements)

Within the FSE-K10/K11 measurement "PHASE/FREQUENCY ERROR" the value "trigger to sync start" is displayed (only if trigger mode "external" is selected). The value is approximately 4.3 us too high. The value is not used in the PASS/FAIL decision of the measurement and is displayed for information purpose only.

The same applies for the "trigger adjusted" value in the trigger adjust function.
